We are still not back to normal, but there is a feeling that things are better and the promises and hopes for living in a senior community are beginning to return.

The virus has certainly left a mark on our world and Atherton and even raised questions about living in a senior community. Is this kind of congregate setting the best value for senior adults? Do the dangers outweigh the risks? Interestingly, I do not think my answer has changed, even though I have lived through this pandemic. I still believe that a senior living community serves an important role in society, and our mission has not changed. Senior communities like Atherton can concentrate a variety of resources which are needed for senior adults as they age. Issues like mobility, illness, medication management, isolation, social activity, and housing upkeep are met at Atherton in a way that unburdens families and solves some practical problems of aging. We provide consistent resources that makes living easier and better. Our mission is to be *"a senior community rooted in Christian values which seeks enriching lives and honor all."* It is through our values of faith, kindness, gratitude, and joy that we seek to fulfill our mission and meet the real needs of senior adults. Though our methods had to change during the pandemic, our mission remained the same and now as our world and our community are recovering, we are looking forward to the next chapter of our community. We hope that you will keep Atherton in your future plans. We still believe that we are a great place to "age well."
